Jocelyn Bailey

Head of Manufacturing Design and Innovation, Policy Connect

Jocelyn will present some of the findings from the Design Commission's research into the use of design within government. Design is increasingly being seen as a tool for better policymaking, public service transformation and negotiating multi-stakeholder problems. Yet the role of the trained designer in this emerging field is contested - which poses an interesting challenge for design education.

Joanna Choukeir

Director, Uscreates

Building service design capacity among education providers: The presentation will cover a process that Uscreates developed with the Learning and Skills Improvement Service to build service design and design thinking capacity among five further education institutions across the UK. The process resulted in a Design for Improvement Guidance targeted at FE providers (but easily transferable across other education providers). The guidance offers simple tools, techniques, resources, and case studies for adopting learner-centered and collaborative service design to develop evidence-based service improvements, promote collaboration across departments, improve learning outcomes and enhance learner experience.

Megha will share thoughts and learnings based on STBY's practice, reflecting on the learnings from both existing and previous projects. The talk will focus on how design & research can be used to support and sustain changes while navigating collaborations across countries and cultures. He will be sharing the story of the past few years designing and developing Flip Yourself, a socially responsive digital startup dealing with youth unemployment in the UK.

Katie Jane Hill has been working in Leeds for ten years on the roles of design in community development. Starting from the domains of regeneration and community consultation, Katie has developed a practice that explores approaches to engaging people in taking action on social and environmental problems within their neighbourhoods. Katie is currently working on several AHRC Connected Communities projects and will talk about her work with Leeds Love It Share It CIC, an independent creative thinktank for Leeds, and how this links to broader agendas such as Connected Communities.

He will present what his programme is working on in Glasgow from the perspective of bridge building between education, social enterprises and community groups, why he feels that is important and the experiences, thus far of doing so. The presentation will explore the context(s) in which Design and Citizenship are currently working, the purpose (towards a sustained future) of their endeavours and the prospects this may afford in future design practice.

Design for Social Innovation and Sustainability (DESIS) International Network partners in the UK, including the University of the Arts London, the Royal College of Art, Lancaster University, Northumbria University, University of Lincoln and Kingston University, have been awarded network funding from the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) to deliver a series of DESIS networking events across the UK during 2013.

The project aims to extend and establish a DESIS-UK Network, as a national multidisciplinary network of individuals and organisations exploring design-led social innovation and sustainability in collaboration with UK HE. It aims to strengthen connections between design academics and academies, design practitioners, and end users of design from public, private and third sector organisations and the communities they serve, to explore how best to employ design thinking and skills to deliver sustainable social and environmental benefits to communities.

The Network aims to help the Universities in promoting and supporting Design for Social Innovation and Sustainability (DESIS) across their schools and courses. It provides an opportunity to help shape the pedagogic focus of DESIS in UK HE in a spirit of peer-to-peer collaboration within a network of institutional partners.

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
